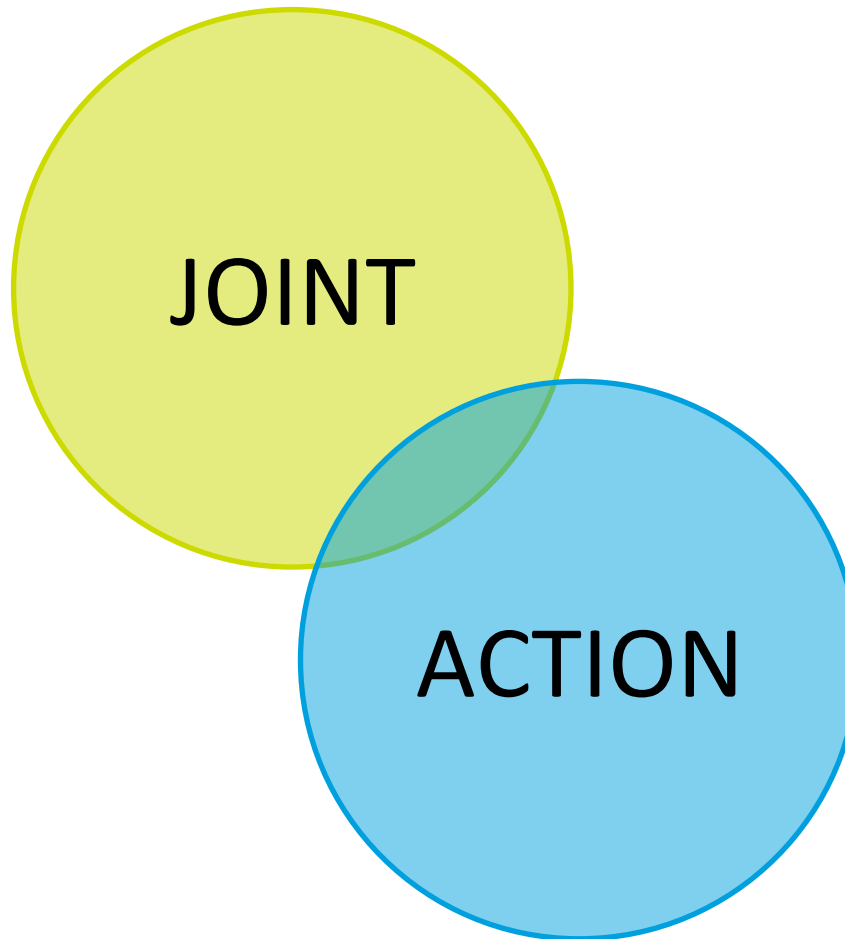

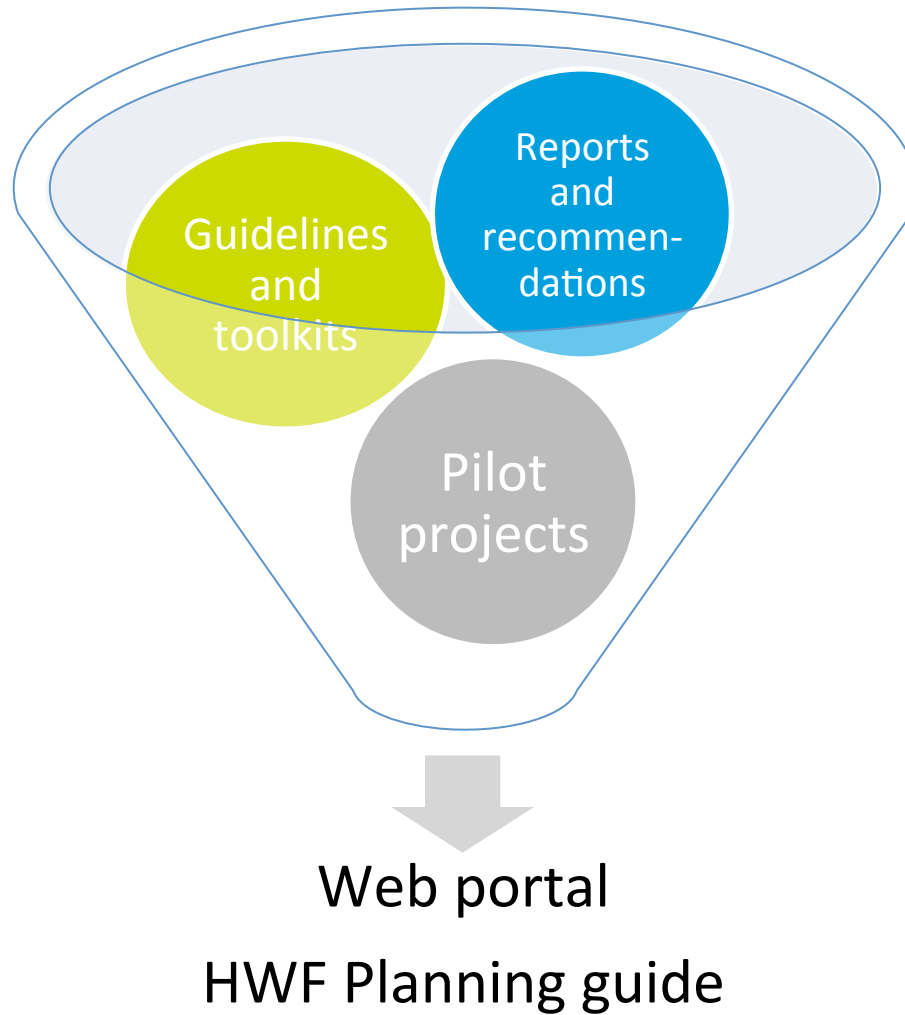
Pilot projects in the JA EUHWF

Good reasons for conducting a pilot study

For the Joint Action:

- Testing adequacy of the proposed methodology
- Assessing the feasibility of a region/country scale implementation
- Designing an implementation protocol
- Assessing whether the implementation protocol is realistic and workable
- Identifying practical or logistical problems which might occur during the implementation and drawing lessons learned
- Determining what resources (finance, staff) are needed for the implementation
- Convincing other stakeholders that the method and implementation protocol is worth supporting

Good reasons for conducting a pilot study

For the Participants:

- Training in the method and protocols
- Coaching during the implementation
- Detailed follow up of results and next steps
- Assuming a lead role and example for other countries
